

We rejoice in the Risen Christ and celebrate the Easter Season with a joyful and lively faith. In an ancient Easter homily, St. John Chrysostom reminds us as he reminded the early Church why we celebrate with such great joy:

"O Death, where is your sting? O Hell, where is your victory? Christ is risen, and you are overthrown. Christ is risen, and the demons are fallen. Christ is risen, and the angels rejoice. Christ is risen, and life reigns. Christ is risen, and not one dead remains in the grave. For Christ, being risen from the dead, is become the first fruits of those who have fallen asleep. To Him be glory and dominion unto ages of ages."

We thank Fr. Nathan Ricci for assisting at Masses during Easter. Father was home from his studies in Rome visiting his family for Easter. He reports that Fr. Connors is studying very diligently as we might expect! Fr. Barrow is on a well deserved vacation this week! We thank our good neighbor, Bishop Evans, for helping to cover Masses.

Why the Easter Bunny?

Fr. Healey is oft to say: "It would not be Easter without Peeps." We all know that little marshmallow treat, deceptively tasty looking on the outside (at least to me, but then again there is no judgment concerning taste), which represents the Easter Bunny. Why is Easter associated with the Easter Bunny? It goes back to Easter Eggs. In Germanic and Anglo-Saxon countries it was the bunny which would bring the eggs. The egg is the symbol of fertility and rebirth which Christians associated with the Resurrection. Eggs were originally painted to represent Christ's blood.

The Easter Bunny has become ubiquitous in America, but at least in Italy rabbits and bunnies are most often associated with stews. The richer symbol for Easter is the lamb. For the Jewish people the lamb was the symbol of sacrifice. In the Book of Exodus, God commanded the Israelites to sacrifice a lamb or a goat and place its blood over the lintel of their home. By doing so, they were passed over and saved from death. God commanded that this event be commemorated in the Passover feast. It was the blood of the sacrificial lamb which forgave the sins of the people in the Temple. The sacrifice of a lamb was merely the pre-figurement of the greatest and final sacrifice: the sacrifice of the Son on the Cross. In Isaiah's famous prophecy the Suffering Servant he writes: "Though he was harshly treated, he submitted and opened not his mouth; like a lamb led to the slaughter or a sheep before the shearers, he was silent and opened not his mouth." Behold, Jesus is the Lamb of God who offers the perfect sacrifice of obedience and love on the Cross to free us from sin, recapitulate God and man, and transform us into his Body (to become sacrificial lambs ourselves). In his resurrection Christ passed over from death into life and this Passover has been extended to us. We partake of this sacrifice in the Mass when we partake of his body and blood.

In many of the ancient churches of Rome the apostles are depicted as lambs. This is not a coincidence (just as many of the parables Jesus gives depict His people as sheep without a shepherd). Jesus asks us to imitate him, take up our crosses, and be transformed into the sacrificial lamb offering up sacrifices of praise, thanksgiving and love. Finally in Revelation, and at every Mass, the heavenly liturgy and banquet is depicted as the worship of the Lamb of God, out of whom flows blood and water. To visualize this image I ask everyone to look up "The Adoration of the Lamb" by brothers Hubert and Jan van Eyck.


