# Mercy Musings



Dear Parishioners:

The season of Lent is soon drawing to a close. We look forward to next Sunday's solemn celebration of Palm Sunday, and with that the beginning of Holy Week. On Palm Sunday the Passion of our Lord will be proclaimed at all Masses. Palm branches will be distributed and blessed at all Masses.

The 10:30AM Mass next Sunday begins with a solemn procession from Mercy Park. We invite all those attending the 10:30AM Mass to gather at Mercy Park before Mass. The Gospel of Palm Sunday is proclaimed as we recount Christ's entry into Jerusalem with a procession. I hope the spring weather cooperates!

Lent is truly a special season of the Catholic Church. The Church has traditionally divided Lent into two parts in order to help us focus on two separate spiritual realities.

The first part of Lent began on Ash Wednesday as we marked "the beginning of the fasting days" and ends on the Saturday before Passion Sunday. The second is known Passiontide. This focuses upon the sufferings of Christ more penitents, of than and catechumens preparing to enter the Church.

In other words, the first half of Lent is focused on "us" and our sinfulness. It reminds us of our need for repentance and mercy. Then we are urged to put on "sackcloth and ashes" and to repent for our sins. We do this with our prayer, fasting and alms giving.

This helps us to focus on interior renewal as we prepare

our hearts to receive the light of Christ into our lives. It is a time of conversion to Christ as we ask Him to "create a clean heart" in us.

Passiontide turns our gaze onto the suffering of the crucified Christ. We prayerfully enter into his Passion, and the events that lead up to his betrayal and death. This helps us to understand the results of our sins and the great love Jesus has for us. It is this love that led our beloved Savior to willingly give up his life for sinners.

Passiontide gives each of us an opportunity to meditate more deeply upon the Passion of Christ. We can do this by reading and reflecting upon the Passion accounts in the Gospel. Also, we can do this by praying the devotion of the Stations of the Cross.

With devotion we gradually prepare our hearts for the great feast of Easter. We anticipate the reality that Jesus Christ conquered sin and death and opened to us the gates of Heaven. We must prepare our hearts for such a wondrous gift, and these two parts of Lent help us do exactly that.

Preaching on the Passion, the Capuchin Father Raniero Cantalamessa, who serves as the official preacher of the Pope and his household suggests:

"On the cross Jesus not only gave us an example of self-giving love carried to the extreme; he also merited the grace for us to be able to bring it to pass, to some extent, in our lives. The water and blood that flowed from his side comes to us today in the sacraments of the Church, in God's word, and even in just looking at the Crucified

One in faith. One last thing John saw prophetically at the cross: men and women of every time and place who were turning their gaze to 'the one who was pierced' and who wept tears of repentance and of consolation (see Jn 19:37 and Zac 12:10). Let us join them in the liturgical actions that will follow in this Holy Week."

The Passion of our Lord dominates the solemn days of Passiontide that begin next week. Therefore, the Church has traditionally covered the crucifix with red cloth and covered all statues in violet. We do this to alert us of the special time that we are in. When we walk into church and notice everything is covered, we immediately know that something is different.

This also focuses our attention on the words being prayed at Mass. When we listen to the Passion, our senses are allowed to focus on the striking words from the Gospel and truly enter into the scene. Finally, the Church veils the crucifix, and statues, to produce a heightened sense of anticipation for coming glory and joy we celebrate on Easter Sunday.

I am away this week preaching the Lenten Mission at Our Lady of Mt. Carmel in Newport Beach, California. Msgr. Cook who preached our Mission last Lent, invited me to return the favor! Please pray for me and for the Mission! Be well. Do good. God Bless.

#### Why should a person go to his or her parish church?

For just about every Catholic, the parish serves as the source and foundation for the transmission of the faith and the sacraments. In this sense the parish serves a similar role analogous to that of the family. The parish is therefore essential to a Catholic's growth in holiness.

The composition of a parish is based on its place or location. Hence it brings together people of different classes and psychology in a unity found nowhere else. This differs from other organizations, religious faiths, and groups. Other groups organize based on shared identities, interests, economic status, causes and so on. Hence they become a sort of club. Granted, some similarities of these kinds may be found in a parish (a parish may be located in a wealthy or poor neighborhood for instance), but none of these serve as the basis of unity for the parish. Since it is based on place, the purpose of a parish is to bring together people of many different backgrounds and classes in a unity that God wants.

In the spiritual life a person should always avoid "shopping" around for churches that suit him or her best. The search for a suitable church makes a person a critic and encourages the growth of pride. On the other hand God wants us to be students.

A Catholic may reject what is false or unhelpful in his or her parish church and may consider finding another parish. A priest who preaches heresy from the pulpit or who makes the Mass more about himself, and not about our Lord, will not be spiritually beneficial. Yet this resort should not be taken flippantly. A Catholic should be receptive to any nourishment that he or she receives at a parish. A priest may be a lousy preacher or the music may be horrid, but an attitude of receptivity creates a condition in the person such that he or she can still hear the voice of God through the imperfect instruments God has placed there. Such a receptivity and humility are secrets to a strong spiritual life even in the midst of the worst of human sinfulness. Furthermore, it leads a person to pause and self-reflect on his or her imperfections and sins.

As St. Paul reminds us, "Then let us no longer judge one another, but rather resolve never to put a stumbling block or hindrance in the way of a brother... Let us then pursue what leads to peace and to building up one another."

The point is to develop one's love for the Mass. We mustn't forget that the Mass itself is the greatest spiritual nourishment any of us can receive in this life, and this is found in the parish. Even if the priest gave a boring homily, you have still received our Lord Himself.



# OPERATION RICE BOWL COLLECTION SECOND COLLECTION NEXT WEEK



More than 40 years ago, Catholics in the United States wanted to respond to famine in Africa. Could people who were hungry and starving be helped through Lenten

prayers, fasting and almsgiving? The answer was yes and the help came in the form of a small cardboard box, marking the beginning of "Operation Rice Bowl" in 1975 in parishes in Allentown, Pennsylvania. Today, CRS Rice Bowl is a tradition for millions of Catholics in the U.S., who employ the Lenten pillars of praying, fasting and almsgiving to change the lives of others while enriching their own. CRS Rice Bowl is the Lenten program of Catholic Relief Services, the official relief and development agency of the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops. Through CRS Rice Bowl, faith communities in every diocese throughout the United States put their faith into action through prayer, fasting and almsgiving. Lenten alms donated through CRS Rice Bowl support the work of CRS in roughly 45 different countries each year. 25% of all donations to CRS Rice Bowl stay in the local diocese, supporting hunger and poverty alleviation efforts. Since its inception in 1975, CRS Rice Bowl has raised nearly \$300 million. Lenten alms go to alleviate hunger and poverty in communities overseas and in the U.S.: seventy-five percent of gifts support CRS' humanitarian programs around the world.


# **Seasons of Hope Support Group**
