# Mercy Musings



Dear Parishioners:

Friday night we On celebrated the Annual OLM School Christmas Pageant. It is always a joyful and happy occasion as our talented students gather to sing songs of the seasons. The Church is always overflowing with smiling siblings parents, and grandparents. The highlight of the evening is the reenactment of the Nativity Story by the students. It is always a great event for our parish and school.

It really is inspiring to be able to sing beautiful Christmas hymns with the students in a spirit of faith, hope and love. Far too many around us have pushed God out of our culture and removed Christ from Christmas. The OLM School Christmas Pageant is truly a faith-filled way to rejoice in the season. It is also a great way to kick off this weekend of rejoicing.

We celebrate this weekend "Gaudete" Sunday, the Sunday of Rejoicing. We rejoice because Christmas is coming soon. We have put away the dour purple vestments and wear the bright rose vestments. This is a sign of our rejoicing in Christ who was born on Christmas Day.

We do not rejoice because we believe Jesus came to bring Heaven down to earth. Rather, we rejoice because we know that Jesus, the Son of God, came to open a path from earth into Heaven. The joy of the Christian is the joy of a hope guaranteed by God Himself. This is true joy, the joy of hope, and Christ is its source.

Pope *Emeritus* Benedict XV commenting on *Gaudete* Sunday reminds us of this joy when he states: "*To transform* 

the world, God chose a humble young girl from a village in Galilee, Mary of Nazareth, and challenged her with this greeting: 'Hail, full of grace, the Lord is with you.' In these words lies the secret of an authentic Christmas. God repeats them to the Church, to each one of us: Rejoice, the Lord is close! With Mary's help, let us offer ourselves with humility and courage so that the world may accept Christ, who is the source of true joy."

This Sunday is called Gaudete Sunday, "Gaudete" being the Latin "Rejoice!" The given entrance antiphon for this Sunday begins, in Latin, with "Gaudete in Domino semper" or "Rejoice in the Lord always." Here's the English translation of beautiful antiphon, a hymn to rejoicing: "Rejoice in the Lord always: I say again, rejoice: let your modesty be known unto all: The Lord is at hand. Let nothing upset you: but in all pravers make vour needs known unto God. "

So let us rejoice! This is the instruction we are given at the beginning of Mass today. In these last weeks of Advent, we might become wearv and distracted. That's why the Church tells us to rejoice. Christ is coming! There's no doubt that the gospel is demanding, but we have the great joy of God's grace and our community of faith spurring us on toward true repentance and total joy!

One way we can rejoice is by rejoicing in God's Mercy! This week the students of the OLM Religious Education Program and the students of OLM School celebrate the

Sacrament of Reconciliation. Of course, Confession is a great way to prepare for the coming of Christ. Cleansing our souls of sin and receiving God's powerful grace of forgiveness and mercy is perhaps the best Christmas gift you can give yourself.

We have scheduled Confessions on Monday nights Saturday 6:00pm and afternoons at 3:00pm. Monday, December 19th we have scheduled two hours of Confession from 6:00pm until 8:00pm. There are to be two priests hearing Confessions per hour with the addition of some guest Confessors. I hope you can find the time during this busy season to stop, pray, and mercv God's forgiveness in Confession. It will most certainty help you to truly rejoice in the season.

Pope Francis teaches: "Advent is a time of rejoicing because it revives the happiest event in history: the birth of the Son of God by the Virgin Mary. Knowing that God is not far away but close, not indifferent but compassionate, not alien but a merciful Father who follows us lovingly with respect for our freedom, all this is the reason for a deep joy."

So let us rejoice for the Lord in coming! Let nothing upset us! Let us pray and make our needs known to God! Go to Confession and prepare the way! Be well. Do good. God Bless. Go Pats!

## Was Jesus born knowing his fate or mission to save us by dying on the cross?

There have been many positions throughout the centuries concerning Christ's knowledge. Some have said that as an infant Jesus did not know his fate, but that as he grew up he gradually began to realize his fate at a certain point. Some have said that Jesus understood his fate to be something quite different than what the Church invented.

The Church teaches that Jesus always knew from birth what his mission or fate would be: to save us from our sins by dying on the cross and rising from the dead. We can appeal to several scriptural passages to support this position. There are several scriptural passages that show us that Jesus knew that he was God incarnate and that he knew his mission. Jesus states, "He who has seen me has seen the Father" (Jn. 14:9); "Just as Moses lifted up the snake in the wilderness, so the Son of Man must be lifted up" (Jn. 3:14); "'But who do you say that I am?' Simon Peter said in reply, 'You are the Messiah, the Son of the living God.' Jesus said to him in reply, 'Blessed are you, Simon son of Jonah'" (Mt. 23:15-17); "My Father, if it is possible, let this cup pass from me; yet, not as I will, but as you will" (Mt. 26:39).

How did Jesus know this? We know that Jesus is a divine person with human and divine natures. Since he has a human nature he has everything proper to it which includes (like us) a mind which learns. Theologians speak of three types of human knowledge in Christ: acquired, infused, and knowledge of the blessed. Jesus learned or acquired things in this life (e.g. the language), hence Luke writes of Jesus growing up "in wisdom and in stature" (Lk. 2:52). So there are some things that Jesus learned through experience. He also had infused knowledge (for example, knowledge of future events). Finally he had "knowledge of the blessed," which means that his human mind has direct knowledge of God because his mind was hypostatically joined to the divine nature. Is it a contradiction to say that Christ both knows things already and has to learn them? There is no contradiction because there are these distinct kinds of knowledge. Therefore by infused knowledge Christ already knows (e.g.) language through direct communication from God, but when he learns it from his parents this is through images or ideas in his mind.



## 3rd Sunday of Advent



he traditional name for the Third Sunday of Advent is Gaudete Sunday. The name comes from *Gaudete in Domino semper*, Latin for "Rejoice in the Lord always," opening words of today's entrance antiphon (brief scriptural text that is usually replaced by an opening hymn).

Because one of Advent's tasks is to prepare us for Christ's return at the end of time, this season once had a penitential quality similar to that of Lent. Gaudete Sunday with its rose vestments and relaxation of austerities softened the period and gave a glimpse of its fulfillment just as its counterpart, Laetare Sunday, did at the midpoint of Lent.

Viewed now as a season of devout and joyful expectation, Advent retains very little of its old penitential focus, but we still have the option of using the liturgical color of rose today as we rejoice that Christmas is near, and Christ's second coming is nearer than it was yesterday.

### **Christmas Anticipation Prayer**



**H**ail and blessed be the hour and moment in which the Son of God was born of the most pure Virgin Mary, at midnight, in Bethlehem, in the piercing cold.

In that hour vouchsafe, O my God, to hear my prayer and grant my desires, [here mention your request] through the merits of Our Savior Jesus Christ, and of His blessed Mother. Amen.

Beginning on St. Andrew the Apostle's feast day, November 30, this beautiful prayer is traditionally recited fifteen times a day until Christmas. This is a very meditative prayer that helps us increase our awareness of the feast of Christmas and helps us prepare ourselves spiritually for His coming.
