Mercy Musings



Dear Parishioners:

It was a long night last Sunday as I watched the Superbowl with some priest friends. It wasn't the ending we were hoping for but it was a game to watch. I offer my congratulations to the Eagles and their fans on their first Superbowl victory.

Football season is now over and MLB Spring Training begins soon. But we have a much more important season ahead of us. The Holy Season of Lent begins this Wednesday, February 14th! There has been much discussion about Ash Wednesday as this year it falls on Valentine's Day!

The observance of Ash Wednesday requires prayer, fasting and abstinence from Valentine's Day, on the meat. other hand, is a day for celebrating romantic love, often by dining out on fancy meals and giving chocolate and expensive gifts to a beloved. It's the first time since 1945 that Ash Wednesday and Valentine's Day have fallen on the same date.

Catholics As our observance of Ash Wednesday should take precedence over any Valentine's Day celebration. There are Catholic roots to Valentine's Day, as it associated with a Catholic saint martyr. However, holiday as celebrated today, is a commercial enterprise complete with greeting cards, expensive meals and people spending millions of dollars.

Ash Wednesday begins our forty days of prayer, fasting and alms giving. Ashes are smeared on our foreheads with the words: "Remember that you are dust and to dust you shall

return."

The act of putting ashes on foreheads symbolizes fragility and mortality, and the need for repentance. Far from being a merely external act, the Church has retained the use of ashes to symbolize that attitude of internal penance to which all the baptized are called during Lent.

Ash Wednesday is but the opening pitch for forty days of "spiritual spring training", Lent. The goal is Easter. The hope is that, if we unite ourselves more closely with Jesus on His cross through more fervent prayer, greater charity to others, and sincere penance for our sins through His mercy we'll be united with Him in His Resurrection.

There is a complete schedule in the bulletin for Ash Wednesday and the Season of Lent at OLM. There are four Masses on Ash Wednesday and they usually see great crowds. Also, I ask you to please take up works of charity by supporting the Rice Bowl Collection and the Catholic Charity Appeal.

Rice Bowls are available to take home and place your sacrificial offerings in throughout Lent. This important collection for the work of Catholic Relief Services aids the hungry of the world. The Annual Catholic Charity Appeal which supports the good works of our Diocese is to be taken up on the weekend of February 25th.

Lent is also a time of penance and conversion from sin. Confessions are heard daily Monday through Friday during Lent at OLM. Also, an extra guest confessor joins us every

Monday night during Lent. On March 24th there are All-Day Confessions at OLM. This Lent make sure to get to Confession!

A penance should be taken up during Lent that might include fasting from some pleasure or comfort in our lives. Giving up something in a sacrificial not superficial way always helps us gain a deeper understanding of Christ's loving sacrifice for us on the Cross.

Also consider taking up some extra daily prayer and committing to a Lenten devotion. With two Daily Masses during Lent we are truly blessed with opportunity to be nourished by the Eucharist. Also, the Stations of the Cross are celebrated every Friday and are a great Lenten Devotion. Plan on making the Lenten Mission in March with Monsignor Douglas Cook.

Pope Francis teaches us: "Lent is the favorable season for renewing our encounter with Christ, living in His Word, in the sacraments and in our neighbor. The Lord, who overcame the deceptions of the Tempter during the forty days in the desert, shows us the path we must take." So take up your Lenten path with zeal and commitment on Ash Wednesday.

Please consider moving your Valentine's Day to Fat Tuesday (Mardi Gras), and keep the Lenten Fast on Ash Wednesday! Pray, fast and give alms! Take up your cross and live your Catholic Faith! Do good. Be well. A Blessed Lent!

What do the Ashes Symbolize?

Carl Sagan boldly proclaimed: "we are starstuff" presumably because we are made from the elements found in stars. While this may lead to grandiose musings on nebulae and ashes, it is bad metaphysics (it is a way of looking at the world known as Reductionism). Yes, we are made from elements found in stars, but we are something different. It would be a mistake to equate the notion of star dust with the Ashes on our foreheads. In fact it does damage to what it means to be a human being, what the true meaning of ashes is, and the fundamental reality and goal of the universe. What is fundamental about the universe and about reality is not star dust or atoms, it is God, who is a Trinity of persons. As Fr. Thomas White O.P. quipped, "the universe is persons all the way down." In fact the universe is geared toward personhood, toward rationality. Fundamentally human beings are not reducible to stars; we are rational beings; we are persons.

First and foremost: we were not created to be dust. In Genesis 3:19 God says to Adam after he sins, "you are dust and to dust you shall return." Ash, therefore, represents mortality as a result of sin. Prior to sin, human beings were God's stewards, coregents in the Garden and not dust. After the fall, the first sin, we are now subject to sin, suffering, and death. Every human being is mortal and we go back after death to a state of dust and ashes.

There are two other levels of meaning to the ashes. They symbolize repentance of sin, and intercessory prayer on behalf of others. We read in Job 42:6: "Therefore, I despise myself, and repent in dust and ashes." In 1 Maccabees 3:47 we read: "They fasted that day, put on sackcloth and sprinkled ashes on their heads." Finally in Daniel 9:3 we read: "I turned to the Lord God, to seek help, in prayer and petition, with fasting, sackcloth, and ashes."

So ashes on Ash Wednesday are an ancient sign of remembering our mortality, repenting of sin, and interceding for others. It begins the Season of Lent whereby we unite our intense time of prayer to a period of fasting and supplication to God, drawing closer to God by detaching ourselves from the pleasures of this world. Lent is the time for us to come back to God.






CALLING ALL MEN!

Lenten Fast and Abstinence Regulations for Catholics

Abstinence from meat on Ash Wednesday and the Fridays of Lent (for those 14 and older) is required by Church law. Also, Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are days of fasting: those between the ages of 18 and 59 should eat less, meaning, take no solid food between meals and only one full meal that day. Serious health conditions excuse a person from these precepts. Pastors and parents are encouraged by the law of the Church to ensure that minors who are not bound by the law of fast and abstinence are educated nonetheless in an authentic sense of penance. Following the implementation of the revised Code of Canon Law on November 27, 1983, the National Conference of Catholic Bishops in the United States determined that the rules of fast and abstinence which have existed for the last several vears this country in be maintained. Namely, that the faithful observe suitable penitential practices on all Fridays throughout the year. These penitential practices need not include abstaining from meat. However, as indicated above, the faithful must not eat meat on all the Fridays of Lent as well as on Ash Wednesday. They must also observe faithfully the fast regulations as they have been stated above in accord with the universal law of the Church (Cf. Code of Canon Law, Canons 1250-1252).
