Mercy Musings



Dear Parishioners:

Snow davs and snowstorms hit us hard last week. Let's hope we've seen the worst of the winter weather this year! I wish to thank Paul Anderson and our **OLM** Maintenance Crew who worked so hard plowing, shoveling and removing hazardous snow and ice from the Church and School property. They did a great job in tough weather conditions so please say "Thanks" when you see them

This week schools are closed for the Winter Vacation. It's hard to believe that February is coming to an end already. We look forward to the beginning of Lent on Ash Wednesday which falls on March 1st this year. Next week's bulletin features more about the Season of Lent and the Lenten Schedule at OLM.

You may have read about a recent "Town Hall Meeting" for the Catholic Parishes in the City of Warwick. The decline in those coming to Mass and receiving the sacraments, and also a reduced number of priests available was the topic. The Warwick parishes are beginning to prepare for a future with less people and less priests.

the The decline in sacramental life of the Church has also led to a decline in the financial support available to keep parishes viable. Manv parishes have large very infrastructures that were built for an era when they were full and thriving. These require a great deal of expense to heat, maintain and keep up.

The recent meeting of Warwick Parishes allowed many parishioners to voice their concerns about the future of their own parish while hearing about the realities of the Catholic Church in the 21st Century.

The reality in Rhode Island is that we have an aging and shrinking population in general. Thus, we have more parishes than people and priests available to serve them. Parishes merging and even some closing, as was seen recently in both Pawtucket and Providence, is part of the reality of the future.

We are blessed to have two priests and a very large. active parish at OLM. However, the reality is that we are a parish of 2,200 registered families but only about 600 OLM families attend Mass regularly and financially support the parish consistently. Across the Diocese, and the country, just a third of Catholics actually attend Mass and financially support their parish regularly.

This is the reality for the Church today. Unlike our past generations of Catholics who were active in the life of their Church, attended Sunday Mass faithfully and contributed to their parish's fiscal stability, today for many Catholics such sacrifice, commitment and faith are not a lived reality.

Yes, many Catholics still continue to come to Church for Baptisms, First Communions, Confirmations and Funerals, and usually do like to attend Mass at Christmas and Easter. However, faithfully dedicating 40 minutes a week to attend Sunday Mass, worship God in prayer and give financial support to their parish, is not a real priority for them. It is a rather sad, but true, reality we face as a Church.

At OLM we are most

certainly grateful to the many good and faithful people that are truly committed to their Catholic Faith and worship of God at Sunday Mass. These people are also most generous in their financial support of the parish, for which we are truly grateful.

OLM is also a parish that has many volunteers who truly commit themselves to living the Catholic Faith. They serve in Outreach Ministry, teach Religious Education, Minister at Masses, serve on boards and volunteer at our parish school, social events and spiritual groups. They contribute to the vitality and life of our parish and generously share their talent and time. We offer our appreciation and give thanks for what they do for God, Church, and OLM!

As a parish family we too must look toward our own future and realize it is to be very different than our past. Let us begin by praying for a renewal of the faith life of many of our fellow parishioners who have somehow fallen away from God, Church and the Sacraments. Let's invite someone we know who has fallen away to join us at Sunday Mass. Let us celebrate our faith with them and share with them how the Eucharistic Lord inspires and nourishes us each Sunday. It may be just a small step but it is an important step forward in our future as Church and Parish.

What is the relation between the Catholic Church and Public Policy?

This Monday, February 20th we celebrate President's Day originally in honor of George Washington, but it has since become an occasion to remember all presidents. It is a good day to reflect on the Catholic Church's participation in public policy here in the United States.

President Washington once said, "Freedom prospers when religion is vibrant and the rule of law under God is acknowledged." Washington, the other founding fathers, and the states themselves saw the value of religion in the public domain, but today the metaphor "Separation of Church and State" has come to mean the prohibition of public displays of faith (the removal of crucifixes and Biblical quotations) and the prohibition of religion in political discourse. Interestingly it is a phrase not found in the Constitution, but is shorthand to refer to the First Amendment: "Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof." Since 1947 there have been three contemporary interpretations of "Separation of Church and State:" strict separationism, non-preferentialism, and the jurisdictional/ federalism-enhancing view.

Strict separationism prohibits the government from any religious influence or exercise (the government is to be irreligious). Non-preferentialism believes that the national government will not establish an official church of the U.S. and it will not favor one religion over another. This does not exclude government support for or influence from a particular religion. Nor does it prohibit the government from supporting piety, religiosity, and religiously grounded morality. The *jurisdictional-enhancing view* argues for no official church and offers protection to each state to maintain religious establishments and policies within its borders. Only one interpretation prohibits the influence of religion in politics and that is the first, which, not surprisingly, has been invoked to silence religious influence in the public square.

Fr. Healey regularly lobbies at the RI General Assembly on issues of poverty, the common good, sanctity of life, and respect for human dignity. In state capitals throughout the U.S. the Catholic Church is advocating for such policies. All of us need to become more active in our local politics to make our voice heard. Please visit www.faithfulcitizenri.org to see how you can get involved. Those who advocate for human life and dignity, peace and justice, and religious freedom reflect biblical values which are the cornerstone of Western Civilization and of the United States. Those who oppose religion in the public square are hacking away at the very foundation upon which they stand. If anyone says: "your opinion is invalid because you are a Catholic and religion cannot be involved in public policies," then they are following only one interpretation of the Constitution. We can appeal to the founding fathers and to the Constitution to support us in our efforts as Catholic Citizens.




