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Mercy Musings



Dear Parishioners:

I hope you were able to celebrate the Fourth of July! It is always a great day to gather with family and friends for a cookout or watch the fireworks. I was with my family at my sister's home in Saratoga, New York for the holiday. We had a great day celebrating our national independence!

Of course, the Fourth of July is truly a day for us to reflect upon our freedoms. We enjoy many freedoms here in our land that others across the globe do not. Freedom and liberty can easily be taken for granted, so let us remember to give thanks to God for our freedom and never take for granted the liberty we enjoy.

Last week I read an article from NBC News that examined the state of politics in Rhode Island. Its premise was that the Ocean State is the last bastion for elected Democrats who are pro-life. It also examined the effort by the so-called "progressives" to oust pro-life state representatives and senators from office.

The central issue for these "progressives" is abortion. Progress for them is expanding abortion on demand and funding it with taxpayer dollars. The article states: "Rhode Island received an 'F' grade from NARAL Pro-Choice America in 2016 and has a General Assembly run almost entirely by Right to Life-backed Democrats."

It's perhaps the only time an "F" is a good grade! Yet we must remain vigilant in the face of renewed efforts to expand abortion and oust pro-life politicians. These efforts are well organized and well funded by national groups.

The article also suggests that the Catholic Church has too much influence in curtailing abortion legislation. Yet a recent Gallup National Poll determined that Americans (48%) still believe abortion (the direct killing of an unborn baby) is morally wrong, while 43 percent believe it is morally acceptable.

Perhaps it is the case that many people, including elected officials, believe that abortion is morally wrong. If the Church has had some influence it may be in helping people, including politicians, understand that all human life is sacred and should be protected and respected in law.

The reason abortion seems to dominate the headlines is because of the pro-abortion lobby's relentless pursuit of its agenda. Under the guise of "women's issues", Planned Parenthood and the National Organization of Women are tireless in trying to expand abortion in RI. They, and their elected allies in the General Assembly, continue to seek the public financing of abortion and advance the passage of radical abortion legislation.

We know that Catholic teaching on the respect for human dignity, and sanctity of human life, is not limited to abortion. In fact, it proclaims that all human life is sacred and that the dignity of every human person is the foundation of a moral vision for our society. This fundamental belief guides our advocacy on behalf of human life and human dignity.

Our social teaching calls us to vigilantly advocate for the

rights of not only the unborn, but also for family life, for immigrants and refugees, for the dying and terminally ill, for the elderly and the poor and on behalf of justice and peace.

In Ireland they recently changed the Irish Constitution and legalized abortion. Now the Prime Minister has announced that Catholic hospitals must be required to perform abortions. And no exemption from this grave moral evil is possible.

This situation in Ireland is precisely why we remain vigilant in advocating for the sanctity of human life and the dignity of the human person. Secular governments and radical activists are not simply vigilant in advancing their agenda but they are in fact relentless!

So as we remember the freedoms we enjoy in the USA, let us also remember we are called to be faithful citizens. Each one of us has a duty and obligation to be civically engaged, but also to proclaim our Catholic faith in the public square, and advocate for life and dignity.

The abortion lobby gave RI an "F" but we must remain relentless in our public advocacy as Catholics. As the late Archbishop Fulton Sheen once said: "A religion that doesn't interfere with the secular order will soon discover that the secular order will not refrain from interfering with it."

Do good. Be well. God Bless America! Go Sox!

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What is natural law?

When Thomas Jefferson wrote in the Declaration of Independence, "We hold these truths to be self-evident..." he demonstrated our founding fathers' belief that the morality of certain principles, and actions, is knowable

to all. As we celebrate our many freedoms this Fourth of July we recognize that many people elsewhere in the world are not so fortunate, and many do not even recognize the same moral laws as us. But such differences do not point to a "moral relativism" in which nothing is really right or wrong in itself, but is only perceived as such by the people. Instead, we as Christians hold that actions are definitively right or wrong based on whether they measure up with the will of God, who is consistent and unchanging as the fullness of all being, goodness, and truth.

We assert that there is a divine moral law that all people must adhere to in order to live justly and well, and to make it back to God. This law is written into the workings of creation because God creates all beings and upholds the universe, designing and ordering all things such that they reflect His wisdom, and point back to Him. That the world itself, including our God-given minds and intellect, should lead us to believe in God, to know Him, and to know what is morally right and wrong suggests that anyone can come to know and follow the divine law. It is written into nature and so we also call it "natural law". But we are also a fallen people and so our capacity for moral judgment can be easily clouded. confusing circumstances we can easily see good things as bad or vice versa. Fortunately God helps us by revealing His will in the Ten Commandments, the teachings of Christ, and Church doctrine. We should follow these precepts and we can even use them to determine right and wrong in more ambiguous cases and in establishing civil laws.

In his Letter from Birmingham Jail Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. writes, "A just law is a man-made code that squares with the moral law or the law of God...an unjust law is a human law that is not rooted in eternal law and natural law. Any law that uplifts the human personality is just. Any law that degrades human personality is unjust." By "personality" MLK here means the design of the human person envisioned and created by God. We should always be able to look towards God, to His law, and to the designedness of things to know what is good and what will lead us to the manner of being for which we were made and in which we will thrive.

We thank God for our freedom here in the USA, and we ask Him to always reveal to us what will lead us to the fulfillment of our nature, to a just and peaceful world, and ultimately to union with Him.

eriods of silence are employed throughout the liturgy to enhance our sense of reverence and to help us focus our attention.

Brief silence follows the presider's, "Let us pray," in order that each member of the assembly might focus on personal or communal needs before the prayer is spoken in the name of all.

Periods of silence are observed during the Liturgy of the Word to show reverence for the Scriptures, to invite all to be attentive, and to give people time to digest what they have heard.

Silence is observed after communion in order that all might reflect on the profound significance of becoming one body by participating in the one bread which is Christ.
