

Mercy Musings



Dear Parishioners:

It's May, the month in which the earth springs into bloom!! It's also the Month of Mary as we honor the Blessed Virgin Mary. It means May Devotions every Monday at OLM this month. May means praying the Rosary.

For centuries, the Catholic Church has set aside the entire month of May to honor the Virgin Mary. Not just one day in May but the entire month. This venerable tradition goes back centuries in its foundations.

In medieval times, it centered around the practice of expelling winter, as May 1st was considered the start of new growth. During this period, the tradition of *Tricesimum*, or "*Thirty-Day Devotion to Mary*," came into being. The idea of a month dedicated specifically to Mary included thirty daily spiritual exercises honoring Mary, the Mother of God.

It was during this era that Mary's Month and the Month of May were combined. This Month of Mary included special devotions organized on each day throughout the month, both at Church, and in homes. This custom became especially widespread during the nineteenth century and remains in practice until today.

Saint Pope Paul VI writing on this venerable tradition in an encyclical letter entitled *Mense Maio*, teaches:

"The month of May is almost here, a month which the piety of the faithful has long dedicated to Mary, the Mother of God. Our heart rejoices at the thought of the moving tribute of faith and love which will soon be paid to the Queen of Heaven in

every corner of the earth.

For this is the month during which Christians, in their churches and their homes, offer the Virgin Mother more fervent and loving acts of homage and veneration; and it is the month in which a greater abundance of God's merciful gifts comes down to us from our Mother's throne."

So please take some time of your busy spring ioin schedules and us honoring the Mother of God at May Devotions on Mondays at 7:00pm. We gather together to pray the Rosary in adoration before our Eucharistic Lord and receive Benediction. It is truly a peaceful time of prayer and reflection away from the busy world around us.

Also, in this Month of May we celebrate First Holy Communion at OLM. Next Saturday at Noon our First Communion Students from OLM School, and the OLM Religious Education Program, celebrate Holy Communion.

It is always a truly beautiful celebration of faith and joy for our parish family as these young Children of God receive Christ in the Eucharist. Please keep them in your prayers. May they be nourished by the Lord truly present in the Eucharist throughout their lives!

Next Sunday is Mother's Day, we mark this special day with our Annual May Crowning of the Blessed Mother. At the 10:30AM Mass, the entire First Communion Class joins us for prayer, and song, as we crown Mary, Queen of the May! The Masses on Mother's Day are offered for all Mothers, living and deceased.

Also, next Saturday Hiep

Van Nguyen, who was a Summer Seminarian at OLM two summers ago, is to be ordained a Transitional Deacon by Bishop Evans.

The Diaconate Ordination on Saturday, May 11th is at 10:00AM at St. Philip Church in Greenville. All are welcome to attend the beautiful Mass. Please keep Hiep in your prayers as he begins his Diaconal Ministry in preparation for his ordination as a priest next June.

We've had a great tradition of Summer Seminarians here at OLM. Last Summer's Seminarian, Patrick Ryan, was recently assigned for priestly and theological studies to the Pontifical North American College beginning next fall. And this summer we are blessed to have Seminarian Dan Mahoney assigned to our parish.

Dan is finishing Second Year at St. John's Seminary in Boston. He is from a Navy family that settled in Wakefield. What is the Easter Season?

When it comes to liturgical seasons, Lent often stands out in our minds as the unique period when our daily life changes, but there is also the unique period of fifty days (longer than the forty days of Lent) after Easter (which ends on Pentecost Sunday). We all know how to live the season of Lent: prayer, fasting and almsgiving. It is almost second nature to Catholics. After Easter Sunday, however, it may seem like we have returned to the status quo. Instead it is important to realize that we have fifty days to celebrate and reflect on the meaning of Easter. Part of living the Easter Season is realizing how profoundly shattering an experience the first Easter season was for those lived during it.

When those first disciples found the empty tomb, trembling, fear, and astonishment came upon them. They feared because what had happened to them was outside anything that could be expected. Their reaction stems from what happens when a creature encounters God. Throughout scripture "fear and trembling" signals the presence of the divine. For instance, Mary at the Annunciation says that she was "greatly troubled at the saying [of the angel]." The angel reassures her: "Do not be afraid." After this initial experience of the divine comes a soul-changing conversion of mind and heart.

What has changed? George Weigel points to five things. First, with the Resurrection we are now living in the "last days," which are unfolding in time and not at some point at the end of time (as some early Christians and even some Christians today think). Second, unlike the resurrection of Lazarus, Christ's resurrection is unique because Christ's body is transformed into a glorified body. Third, Christ is now sacramentally present to us particularly in the Eucharist in which we receive his resurrected body and blood. Fourth, the resurrection is a life-changing experiencing. We see this in the Apostles. They went from being afraid in the upper room to going out and spreading the Gospel (with the result that most would be martyred). Fifth, worship changes and Sunday is now the 8th day of the new creation because it is the day Christ rose. Benedict XVI writes, "Only an event that marked souls indelibly could bring about such a profound realignment of religious culture... [The] celebration of the Lord's day... is one of the most convincing proofs that something extraordinary happened that day."

This is part of what the Easter Season tries to capture: that majestic and shattering sense that something radical has happened; that life and existence have been fundamentally changed.

he paschal candle should stand in the sanctuary during the entire season of Easter.

This candle symbolizes the risen Christ who conquers sin and death and, for that reason, is lit during baptisms and usually at funerals as well.

Each year, a new paschal candle is prepared during the opening rites at the Easter Vigil. It is marked with a cross, an alpha and omega, and the numerals of the year. Five grains of incense, representing the wounds of Christ, are also embedded into the wax.
