

Mercy Musings



Dear Parishioners:

November has arrived and with it our commitment and duty as Christians to pray for the dead. During this All Souls Month of November we especially recall the poor souls in purgatory.

The Church teaches us that after death there is for some a state of purgation, more commonly called Purgatory. It is entirely different from Hell. It is simply a purifying process for those who die in God's grace but are not yet prepared to enjoy the glory of heaven.

Saint Pope John Paul II described purgatory in these words: "Those who live in this state of purification after death are not separated from God but are immersed in the love of Christ. Neither are thev separated from the saints in heaven or from us on earth. We all remain united in the Mystical Body of Christ, and we can therefore offer up prayers and good works on behalf of our brothers and sisters purgatory."

It is good theology, and it is good common sense. Imagine if we got a call when we got home and they told us that the President or the Pope was coming for dinner. Wouldn't we want some time to prepare? Wouldn't we want to get ready to greet them?

And so it is when we are called at death to the eternal banquet by God, our loving Father. Jesus tells us in the Gospel of John: "I go to prepare a place for you." So we too prepare to meet our Lord, by our time in purgatory.

This is why the Church has the ancient and venerable

tradition of praying for the dead and why we have Masses for the dearly departed. It is also why we have the feast of All Souls, for the souls in purgatory.

This tradition can be seen as far back as the Old Testament in the book of Maccabees which tells us: "it is good to pray for the dead." St. Augustine, the great Doctor of the Church, once remarked about cemeteries that "monuments are built for the survivors but prayer is the best way to assist the dead."

We pray for the dead, and have Mass offered for the repose of their souls, because the dead who are in Purgatory depend upon the aid and charity of our prayers. For that reason, we have the custom of calling them poor souls.

We are urged to always remember the dead daily in our prayers, and at Masses. These beloved souls undergoing purification after death depend completely upon the charitable remembrances of us who are their fellow members in the Mystical Body of Christ, the Church. At the same time, they continue to love us and can also pray for us.

Today in a very special way we remember our fellow OLM parishioners who died over the last year. We remember them and all souls during this month. Eternal rest grant unto them, O Lord. And may perpetual light shine upon them. May they rest in peace.

This Sunday night at the 5:00pm Mass, we celebrate with great joy as a parish with the 88 young adults who are to receive the Sacrament of Confirmation and begin a new chapter in their

young lives as Catholic disciples.

They receive the gifts of the Holy Spirit and the grace of God to help them live as courageous witnesses of Christ in the world. We are grateful that they have chosen to come forward for the Sacrament and continue to grow in their Catholic Faith.

We thank their parents and sponsors who have led them to this important occasion in their faith life. We also thank the many teachers who taught them the ways of Christ and the rich teaching of the Catholic Church.

We must also thank Bishop James F. Checchio of Metuchen, NJ for traveling to OLM to celebrate Confirmation with our young adults. It is a great privilege to have him with us for this special occasion in the life of our parish.

Bishop Checchio's "Be episcopal motto is reconciled to God." This motto recalls St. Paul's appeal for us to continue the central mission for which Jesus was sent by the Father. And so let us pray for our newly Confirmed that they may always be reconciled to God their lives. Mav continue to grow in faith, hope and love as they go forth sealed Holy Spirit and with the confirmed in their Catholic Faith.

We offer a warm welcome to Bishop Checchio and our prayerful congratulations to our *Confirmandi*! Do good. Be well. God Bless! Happy Veterans' Day!

Why can't a parent be a Confirmation Sponsor?

The role of the Godparent or Sponsor in the Catholic Church (whether it be for the Sacrament of Baptism or Confirmation) has lost much of its significance today. People consider it a ceremonial position, or position of honor for a family member or close friend, when in fact, the purpose of a sponsor is much more significant. For an adult or teenager, the role of a Godparent or Sponsor is to assist the person in fulfilling Christian initiation. For an infant, a sponsor is to present the child for baptism with the child's parents, and to help him/her live a Christian life fitting for a baptized person, and to fulfill faithfully the duties inherent in his/her baptism. In other words, the sponsor is not supposed to disappear from the baptized or confirmed person's spiritual life after the sacrament is received. A concrete plan of action for any sponsor or godparent is to follow the corporal and spiritual works of mercy and impart them on the candidate.

In order to fulfill this role a sponsor needs to live the Catholic faith. We do not save ourselves and in order to impart unto others the saving truth and grace of the faith, we ourselves must be nourished by it (by coming to the sacraments, particularly Mass and Confession). Likewise, a sponsor must be confirmed and received Holy Communion, be at least sixteen years of age, not be under any canonical penalty (such as excommunication), and may not be the father or mother of the person to be baptized.

Is it simply because it is in Canon Law that a parent cannot be a sponsor? Are not parents the most concerned about a child's faith and the ones able to be with the child to help nurture their faith? As I wrote, the role of the Godparent or sponsor is to "assist the parents in raising children in the faith." We take this definition literally: a parent cannot assist himself/ herself. A parent exercises a greater role or function in the sacrament of Confirmation and in raising the child in general. The sponsor participates in that function, but not to the same extent.


