Dear Parishioners:

Happy Feast of the Epiphany! It is hard to believe that the Christmas Season is drawing to an end already. It always seems to pass too quickly and end too swiftly.

For many in our society Christmas seems to end on December 26th when people take down their trees and decorations. The stores put up the Valentine's Day merchandise before the New Year even arrives! For others the Christmas Season ends with the celebration of New Year's Day.

However, in the life of the Church the great and holy Season of Christmas doesn't officially end until the Feast of the Baptism of the Lord. Many think it ends with the Epiphany but we return to the Season of Ordinary Time next week after we celebrate the Lord's Baptism.

We will still be celebrating Christmas at Our Lady of Mercy until Monday, January 14th! So keep those trees and crèches up in your homes as they will remain up in our Church. Keep the lights on the trees outside and continue to wish everyone a "Merry Christmas." For as Yogi Berra once said: "It ain't over til it's over!"

In fact in much of the world, Christmas gifts are not exchanged until the Epiphany. It is a celebration in imitation of the Three Kings bringing their gifts to the Christ Child.

In Spain, the Three Kings stop by the house and fill shoes with candy and goodies to celebrate the birth of Christ. So be sure to put your shoes outside the door on Sunday night and maybe the Wise Men will stop by and fill them.

In Germany, they have the wonderful custom of blessing homes on the Epiphany. The head of the household writes above the front door with chalk the following: 20 + C + M + B +This represents the year, 2013, plus the first initial of the Three Kings: Caspar, Melchior and Balthazar. It also can be read as the first letters of the Latin phrase: Christus Mansionem Benedicat, which means "May Christ Bless this House. "

If you write this above the door, the Three Kings stop and Christ blesses your home! The following prayer is said by all the families who wish their home to be blessed on the Epiphany:

God of heaven and earth, you revealed your only Son to every nation by the guidance of a star. Bless this home and all who live in it. Fill us with the light of Christ, that our concern for others may reflect your love. We ask this through Christ who dwells among us. Amen.

Loving God, may all who come to our home this year rejoice to find the love of Christ here; and may we seek and serve, in everyone we meet, that same Jesus who is your incarnate Word, now and forever. Amen.

In Rome it is the tradition for the Pope to ordain new bishops on the Epiphany because it is a feast that emphasizes the Church's universality. The

Epiphany marks the day when the infant Christ was recognized by the Magi who were really representatives of the world at large. Usually these new bishops are from around the world and serve in many different countries. Let us pray for these new bishops that as successors of the Apostles they might proclaim the Gospel with zeal, holiness, faith and integrity.

The Catechism Corner

For many years in the English speaking world the feast of Epiphany has been overshadowed by that of Christmas. But unless we realize the significance of this great day, we see only one side of the mystery of the

Incarnation. Now after contemplating the staggering fact that God has become a human child, we turn to look at this mystery from the opposite angle and realize that this seemingly helpless Child is, in fact, the

omnipotent God, the King and Ruler of the universe. The feast of Christ's divinity completes the feast of His humanity. We see that whereas Christmas is the family feast of Christianity, Epiphany is the great "world feast of the Catholic Church." Epiphany is a complex feast. Originating in the Eastern Church and formed by the mentality of a people whose thought processes differ sharply from our own, the Epiphany is like a rich Oriental tapestry in which the various themes are woven and interwoven-- now to be seen in their historical setting, again to be viewed from a different vantage point in their deep mystical significance. The Epiphany takes its name from the Greek "epiphania," which denotes the visit of a God to earth. The first idea of the feast is the manifestation of Christ as the Son of God. "Begotten before the daystar and before all ages, the Lord our Savior is this day made manifest to the world." The feast unites three events in the life of Christ when His divinity, as it were, shines through His humanity: the adoration of the Magi; the baptism of Christ in the Jordan; and the first miracle at the wedding feast of Cana. Moreover, at Epiphany the Church looks forward to the majestic coming of Christ on the "youngest day" when His manifestation as God will be complete. A second important idea in Epiphany is the extension of Christ's kingship to the whole world. The revelation of Christ to the three kings at Bethlehem is a symbol of His revelation to the whole of the Gentile world. Epiphany presents to us the calling of not merely a chosen few, but all nations to Christianity. Closely linked to both these themes of divine manifestation and world kingship is a third idea running through the Epiphany feast: that of light. During Advent, the world was in darkness, and we prayed and waited in the spirit of the Jewish nation which lived in expectation of the Coming Light during thousands of years. At Christmas the Light shone forth, but dimly, seen only by a few around the crib: Mary and Joseph and the shepherds. But at Epiphany the Light bursts forth to all nations and the prophecy is fulfilled: "The Gentiles shall walk in Thy light, and kings in the brightness of Thy rising." Epiphany of the Lord



he solemnity of the Epiphany which celebrates the manifestation of God to humanity began in the Eastern Church in the third century.

Called *Theophany*, it was primarily a feast of the baptism of the Lord, but it also incorporated themes of his nativity, the visit of the magi, and the marriage feast at Cana

The church of Rome adopted this celebration in the fourth century and focused it on the adoration of the magi since it already had a feast of the Lord's nativity in place.

In the United States, we observe the Epiphany on the Sunday between January 2 and 8, but there are places where it is celebrated as a holy day of obligation on the traditional date of January 6.

A Message from Our Holy Father

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

Today, we joyfully celebrate the Epiphany of the Lord, his manifestation to the peoples of the entire world, represented by the Magi who came from the East to render homage to the King of



the Jews. Observing the heavenly phenomena, these mysterious personages had seen a new star and, instructed by the ancient prophets as well, they recognized in it the sign of the Messiah's birth, a descendant of David (cf. Mt 2: 1-12). From its initial appearance, therefore, the light of Christ began to attract to

himself the people "with whom he is pleased" (Lk 2:14), of every tongue, people and culture. It is the power of the Holy Spirit that moves hearts and minds to seek truth, beauty, justice, peace. It is what the Servant of God John Paul II affirmed in the Encyclical *Fides et Ratio*: "men and women are on a journey of discovery which is humanly unstoppable - a search for the truth and a search for a person to whom they might entrust themselves" (n. 33). The Magi found both of these realities in the Child of Bethlehem.

Men and women of every generation need on their pilgrim journey to be directed: what star can we therefore follow? After coming to rest "over the place where the child was" (Mt 2: 9), the purpose of the star that guided the Magi ended, but its spiritual light is always present in the Word of the Gospel, which is still able today to guide every person to Jesus. This same Word, which is none other than the reflection of Christ, true man and true God, is authoritatively echoed by the Church for every well-disposed heart. The Church too, therefore, carries out the mission of the star for humanity. But something of the sort could be said of each Christian, called to illuminate the path of the brethren by word and example of life. How important it is that we Christians are faithful to our vocation! Every authentic believer is always traveling his own personal itinerary of faith, and at the same time, with the little light that he carries within himself, can and must be a help to those alongside him, and even help the one for whom finding the way that leads to Christ is difficult. —Angelus Message, January 6th, 2008
