The Catechism Corner

Last week we began looking at the Act of Contrition phrase by phrase to hopefully come to a better understanding of sin in our life and also of the

forgiveness of the Lord offered to us in the Sacrament of Confession. began by looking at "O, my God, I am heartily sorry..." This week we'll look at what exactly we are sorry for--by praying "for having offended Thee." YEAR OF FAITH 2013 Some modern-minded people dismiss



the idea that our sins are "offenses" to the Lord. God is so far beyond us that our sins become insignificant in His eyes. Does God really care if we steal that last parking spot from the person waiting for it--whether we're at the mall or at Church?? Does it matter to God if we insult the cashier at the local coffee shop by our condescending attitude?? God has bigger and better things to do than to worry about how I get along with the neighbor on the other side of the back fence and whether or not I secretly dump my leaves in their yard. Such thinking leads us astray from the truth because everything that we do matters in the eyes of the Lord. Since Jesus assures time and time again in the Gospel of the Father's love then how can we think that what we do doesn't matter to Him?? In truth, every sin from the slightest to the most grave is an offense against God and an offense against the person He has called each one of us to become. "Sin is an offense against God: 'Against you, you alone, have I sinned, and done that which is evil in your sight.' (Psalm 51:4) Sin sets itself against God's love for us and turns our hearts away from it." You see, we don't change God's "feelings" towards us, for He cannot love any one of us any more than He already does. What we do when we sin is close off ourselves to His love--and we close off ourselves to ourselves as well and even to each other. "Sin is [also] an offense against reason, truth, and right conscience; it is a failure in genuine love for God and neighbor caused by a perverse attachments to certain goods. It wounds the nature of man and injures human solidarity." That's how offensive sin truly is. It brings this rupturing and disordering each and every time we choose to sin. The Lord desires over and over again to bring us back to Himself--to convert and soften our hearts to His Love and to open our minds to His Truth. "O, my God, I am heartily sorry for having offended Thee..." Knowledge of the offense helps us to grow in contrition and growth in contrition always means a growth in grace. Next week we'll consider how God converts us and brings us back to Himself using that contrition and awareness of the offense against Him. In the meantime, it might be helpful to avoid those "offenses" to the Lord, by checking it out in the Catechism of the Catholic Church #1849-1850

2nd Sunday of Advent, Year C



s we celebrate this second Sunday of the new liturgical year, we note that this is a C year in the three-year cycle of Sunday readings. In C years, we concentrate on the Gospel of Luke. In A years, we read Matthew, and in B years, we delve into Mark.

A gentile convert to Christianity, Luke was a friend and disciple to Paul and possibly a physician. He was a sophisticated literary stylist who produced not only this Gospel but its companion volume, the Acts of the Apostles, as well.

More than the other evangelists, Luke presents Christ as a universal figure, one who accepts all kinds of outcasts from shepherds to Samaritans and one whose genealogy can be traced all the way back to Adam.

It is from Luke's Gospel that we receive our fondest images of the events surrounding the nativity.

Pope Benedict XVI's Advent Message

Today the Church begins a new liturgical year, a path that is further enriched by the Year of Faith, 50 years since the opening of the Second Vatican Council. The first Time of this journey is

Advent, composed, in the Roman Rite, of the four weeks that precede the Birth of the Lord, that is, the mystery of the Incarnation. The word "Advent" means "coming" or "presence." In the ancient world, it signified the coming of the king or the emperor into one of the provinces; in the language of Christians, it referred to the coming of God, to His presence in the world; a mystery that




involves the whole of the cosmos and of history, but that recognizes two culminating moments: the first and the second coming of Jesus Christ. The first is the Incarnation itself; the second is the glorious return at the end of time. These two moments, chronologically distant - and it is not given to us to know how far apart they are - touch us deeply, because by His death and resurrection Jesus has already accomplished that transformation of humanity and of the cosmos that is the final goal of creation. But before that end, it is necessary that all His enemies should be put under His feet (cfr. 1 Cor 15,25; Ps 110,1). This saving plan of God, which is always taking place, continually requires the free adherence and collaboration of man; and the Church, which is like the Betrothed, the promised bride of the crucified and risen Lamb of God (cfr. Rev 21,9), lives by leaning upon the memory of her Lord and awaiting His return: a wait consisting in a vigilant and active hope. It is to this that the Word of God recalls us today, tracing out a line of conduct to pursue in order to be ready for the coming of the Lord. In the Gospel of Luke, Jesus says to the disciples: "Beware that your hearts do not become drowsy from carousing and drunkenness and the anxieties of daily life . . . Be vigilant at all times and pray." So: simplicity and prayer. And the apostle Paul adds the invitation to "increase and abound in love" among ourselves and towards everyone, to strengthen our hearts and to be blameless in holiness (cfr. 1 Thess 3, 12-13). In the midst of the turmoil of the world, or the desert of indifference and materialism, Christians accept the salvation of God and witness to it by a different way of life, as a city set on a hill. "In those days," the prophet Jeremiah proclaims, "Jerusalem shall dwell safely; this is the name they shall call her: 'The Lord our justice'" (Jer 33,16). The community of believers is a sign of the love of God, of His justice that is *already* present in history, but *not* yet fully realized, and that therefore should always be awaited, invoked, and sought after with patience and courage. The Virgin Mary perfectly embodies the spirit of Advent, which consists of listening to God, a profound desire to do His will, and joyful service to others. Let us be guided by her, so that God who is coming may not find us closed or distracted, but might extend to each of us a small part of His kingdom of love, of justice, and of peace.
