Mercy Musings



Dear Parishioners:

Some of you may be familiar with the term "Easter Duty" and relate it to the obligation to go to confession and receive Holy Communion during the Easter season. If you already have a habit of regular Confession and Communion, you can fulfill the obligation without much effort. If not, it is worthwhile to recall what the Church requires and why.

When considering our sacramental duties, we should first realize that the Church proposes certain rules and requirements to help us grow in grace and get to heaven. The idea of making our "Easter Duty" stems from two related Church laws: to receive the Eucharist at least once a year during the Easter season, unless serious reason indicates a another time preferable as (canon 920); and to receive absolution in sacramental confession for any mortal sin at least once a year (canon 989).

Of course. this is the minimum required by the today Church. and most practicing Catholics receive Communion during, not only the Easter season (broadly defined as the period from the First Sunday of Lent to Trinity Sunday), but also many other times of the year when not in a grave state of sin.

Less popular, however, is the practice of Confession. One motivator for confession is often a nagging uneasiness that we experience when we have hurt someone, and a desire to set things right. We may try to dismiss this uneasy feeling or rationalize our behavior, but ultimately we know that we have fallen short and sinned. We need to make amends with those whom we've wronged and realize that God is the first one offended by sin.

That is why we make our way to the confessional — to present ourselves before Jesus in the person of the priest and receive the Lord's pardon and absolution. peace in The Catechism teaches that this sacrament has many effects, the foremost of which is "restoring us to God's grace and joining us with him in an intimate friendship" (1468).

Sin damages our relationship with God. We don't deserve, and cannot earn. God's forgiveness, yet he gives it for the asking. In Confession, we drink from the depths of Divine Mercy, where God replenishes us with the graces needed to live in and act out of love each day. Considering that we are reborn spiritually in confession and fortified by grace in Holy Communion, we should think of our Easter Dutv as an opportunity to become the better disciple God calls us to be.

Next Saturday we have All-Day Confessions with four priests available every hour from 9:00AM until 3:00PM. It is a great opportunity to make a good Confession, do your Easter Duty and clean your soul! Invite someone you know who has been away from the Sacrament of Confession for a while to come to All Day Confessions.

Next weekend we celebrate Palm Sunday and I am happy to announce we will be blessing and distributing palm branches at all Masses. Last year due to the COVID-19 restrictions we were prohibited from doing this. With more vaccinations and restrictions easing up, we will resume this great tradition.

Of course, Palm Sunday is more than getting our palm branches. The day is called both "Palm Sunday" and "Passion Sunday." The first name comes from the fact that it commemorates Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem, when the crowd had palm branches (John 12:13). The second name comes from the fact that the narrative of the Passion is read on this Sunday.

Pope Benedict Emeritus XVI states: "Palm Sunday is the great doorway leading into Holy Week, the week when the Lord Jesus makes his way towards the culmination of his earthly existence. He goes up to Jerusalem in order to fulfil the *Scriptures and to be nailed to the* wood of the Cross, the throne from which he will reign for ever. drawing to himself humanity of every age and offering to all the gift of redemption."

I ask for your prayers this week as I am on my Annual Retreat at Arnold Hall in Pembroke, Massachusetts. Last year I wasn't able to go on retreat due to the pandemic. Please know of my prayers for you while on retreat. Get ready for Holy Week and make your Easter Duty. Stay safe. Be well. Do good. God Bless! Rice Bowl Collection is next Sunday, please be generous. Why are there forty days of Lent?

We are now in the midst of Lent. Very often we call it the "40" days of Lent. There is a strong Biblical foundation for observing a 40 day period of more intense prayer, fasting and almsgiving (we should be doing these things year round). The Scriptures are full of the significance of the number 40.

In the Old Testament, God punished mankind by sending a flood over the earth for 40 days and nights. The people of Nineveh repented of their sins with 40 days of fasting. The Prophet Ezekiel lay on his right side for 40 days as a precursor to the siege and destruction of Jerusalem. The Prophet Elijah fasted and prayed for 40 days on Mount Horeb. Moses fasted 40 days and nights while on Mount Sinai. Moses and the Israelites wandered in the desert for 40 penitential years until they entered the Promised Land.

While there are many references to 40 days in the Old Testament, the main reason Lent is 40 days is in imitation of Jesus Christ. In the New Testament, the Lord fasted for 40 days and nights in the desert in preparation for the beginning of His public ministry. As the Catechism of the Catholic Church tells us: "By the solemn forty days of Lent the Church unites herself each year to the mystery of Jesus in the desert."

Yet, counting out exactly the 40 days takes more than a little work. The season of Lent (Ash Wednesday to Holy Thursday) is technically, give or take, 44 days. We could do some math to make the number of days for penance and fasting before Easter 40 (44 days minus 6 Sundays, plus Good Friday and Holy Saturday equals 40). Yet that still does not take into account the two solemnities which usually fall within Lent and are not days of penance and fasting (e.g. St. Joseph's Day [March 19] and the Annunciation [March 25]). Further, Sundays are still technically part of Lent (hence the reason why we number them 1st Sunday of Lent, 2nd, and so on. Also, the readings for each Sunday frame each Lenten week). At the very least Lent is a symbolic 40 days of more intense prayer, fasting and almsgiving.




