

Mercy Musings



Dear Parishioners:

On Monday morning, I was surprised to read about myself and Our Lady of Mercy in the Providence Journal. In the Political Scene column by reporter Katherine Gregg. a listing of lobbyists and elected officials who received loans from the federal Paycheck Protection Program (PPP) included me and OLM.

The PPP was enacted by the Trump Administration and Congress to protect jobs. The recipients of the program include all kinds of businesses, non-profits, and other institutions, including many in the Catholic Church.

It is a program to keep people working and paid during the unprecedented crisis of the Covid-19 Pandemic. The PPP's purpose is to sustain the economy and ensure workers stay employed. The amount of each loan is based upon the number of employees and the cost of salaries and benefits. Our Lady of Mercy Church benefited from the program, and it is a matter of public record. OLM employs 44 full and part-time employees in both our parish and school. We received a PPP loan of \$400,000 to cover the costs of our employees' salaries, healthcare, and pension benefits for two months.

As a result of the closing of Churches and schools, we had a sharp decline in income. This program enabled us to keep our employees paid and working. None of our OLM employees were furloughed or laid off.

Our biggest OLM School fundraiser, "the Spring Fling," was canceled due to the pandemic. Many of our school families faced financial hardship during the pandemic, and tuition payments had to be suspended. Also, our weekly church collection continues to decline due to the crisis

However, our outstanding OLM School teachers worked overtime during the height of the pandemic with the distance learning classes. I was grateful they could be paid. Also, as a result of the PPP, our OLM Outreach efforts to the poor, especially in time of crisis, continues. So does the increased maintenance work by our staff to sanitize and make our plant safe and hygienic.

The Catholic Church, overall, is one of the largest employers in the State of Rhode Island. The Diocese of Providence also benefited from the PPP. The annual Catholic Charity Appeal began as the pandemic broke out. As a result, it raised little toward the annual goal of \$7 Million.

The CCA helps to fund the many employees who administer the daily support and charitable work the Catholic Church provides to the poor, the sick, the aged, the migrants, the refugees and the needy of our state. It provides critical services and assistance to the vulnerable and needy.

Following some national news stories on the Catholic Church receiving PPP loans, Archbishop Coakley, Chair of the USCCB's Committee on Domestic Justice, offered a response and it is in this week's bulletin. He says in part:

"The Catholic Church is the largest non-governmental supplier of social services in the

United States. The novel coronavirus only intensified the needs of the people we serve and the demand for our ministries. The loans we applied for enabled our essential ministries to continue to function in a time of national emergency."

I admit that I was genuinely perplexed at the purpose of Ms. Gregg's column last Monday. After all nothing illegal or unethical occurred. What did happen was that many diverse groups benefited from a program designed precisely to help them, and that had the full backing and support of Congress. Is it newsworthy that faith groups also benefited from a program designed to help them and others in times of national crisis?

I am genuinely grateful that the PPP is available to aid all faith communities. However, many didn't want church groups, especially the Catholic Church, to benefit from this program. Not surprising in our increasingly secular society that is hostile to organized religion. Some of the opposition is a clear reminder that the Anti-Catholic Know-Nothings of the 19th Century still exist today.

Thankfully both the Administration and the U.S. Congress know the critical need and clearly understand the value of faith communities to the common good of our nation. We are grateful they do, and thank them! Stay safe. Be Well. Do Good! God Bless.

What is Detraction?

A word can have powerful influence in the culture, even when a word is not precisely defined. In our day and age that word is "transparency." We hear calls for transparency both inside and outside of the Church, from the movie sets of Hollywood, to the boardroom, and perhaps eventually (if we are not careful) to the confessional. "Transparency" could be considered jargon because of its varied interpretation and indeterminate application. Jargon is dangerous precisely because it is indeterminate and its definition changes (inconsistently) from person to person.

Hence in the Screwtape Letters, Screwtape advises Wormwood that "Jargon, not argument, is your best ally in keeping him from the Church." How far does confidentiality extend? When and what material qualifies for confidentiality or transparency? Who is exempted from transparency? How much of our personal lives and sins are open for discussion? Worryingly, while there have been calls and legislation for Church transparency very little legislation has been brought forth regarding transparency in public schools or political institutions. Hence transparency could be a dangerous tool to destroy reputations and institutions. And as a strategy it is still too new to see if it really serves as a solution to the perennial problems of human sinfulness. More often than not we like transparency when it applies to everyone but ourselves.

"Transparency" does not appear once in the Catechism of the Catholic Church. One word, however, which does appear is detraction. The Catechism defines detraction as "[the disclosure] of another's faults and failings to persons who did not know them... without [an] objectively valid reason" (2477). Such disclosure damages the reputation and honor of one's neighbor. It is a sin against the 8th Commandment, which tells us not to misrepresent the truth against others. The sin can be either venial or mortal depending on the circumstances. As a sin detraction offends against both justice and charity. This is because a person has a natural right to the honor of his name and reputation. Notice that in detraction the information revealed may actually be true or at least honestly considered true by the detractor. Meanwhile, calumny is the sin which damages another's reputation using false information.

In order to avoid detraction we need an objectively valid reason to reveal a hidden fault. One may reveal a hidden fault for the purpose of preventing harm or protecting the person or others. For instance a teacher or counselor may reveal that a child is having suicidal thoughts to a parent so that the parent may get help for the child. One may also reveal what has become known through courts of law, provided that such information is true and notorious. Criminals should be known for the sake of and in view of the public welfare. Revealing criminal acts simply for the sake of revealing them does not justify disclosure. Indiscriminate disclosure of criminal information should not be disclosed, however, so as to not jeopardize the reputation of other persons belonging to the same group or organization.



Bishop Chairman Comments on Paycheck Protection Program



The novel coronavirus only intensified the needs of the people we serve and the demand for our ministries. The loans we applied for enabled our essential ministries to continue to function in a time of national emergency.

shutdown In addition. orders and economic fallout associated with the virus have affected everyone, including the thousands of Catholic ministries -churches. schools. healthcare and social services -- that employ about 1 million people in the United States. These loans have been an essential lifeline to keep hundreds of thousands of employees on payroll, ensure families maintain their health insurance, and enable lay workers to continue serving their brothers and sisters during this crisis.
